




Leaf Collection Schedule



2013 Collection Schedule:

- A:** (3rd - 12th, Ivy - Nyssa)
Oct. 28th – Nov. 1st
- B:** (Oaklea Middle School Area)
Nov. 4th – 8th
- C:** (Bailey Pk, SW Laurel Area)
Nov. 18th – 22nd
- D:** (East of Ivy Street)
Dec. 2nd – 6th

Leaf Collection 2013

- ◆ Consider using leaves as mulch for gardens and flower beds
- ◆ Place leftover leaves in the street for the City to collect. Be sure leaves don't clog storm drains or gutters. Place leaves ONE FOOT away from the curb.
- ◆ If you see crews working in your neighborhood early, don't worry! They will return during your scheduled week.
- ◆ Please **DO NOT** bag leaves.

Leaf pickup in November is the ONLY time that any material or item may be placed in any right-of-way. Leaves are the only items that will be picked up during that time if placed 12-inches from the curb.

RATE PAYER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

WASTE PREVENTION TIPS

1. Use rechargeable batteries.
2. Use refillable pens, water bottles, lighters, and razors, not disposables.
3. Purchase products with post-consumer recycled content.
4. Buy in bulk whenever possible.
5. Bring your own reusable bag to the store.
6. Request “no bag please, “ if buying only a few items.

Why Recycle?

Recycling conserves natural resources and saves energy! Every ton of recycled paper, cans or plastic saves trees, habitat, electricity and water resulting in less air and water pollution than manufacturing from natural resources.

Recyclables are sorted, baled and sent to recycling mills, where they are made into new products:

- ◆ Plastic bottles become new fleece clothing and carpeting among other things
- ◆ Cardboard becomes new cardboard
- ◆ Tin cans become new rebar for construction projects
- ◆ Newspaper becomes fruit packaging trays and new paper
- ◆ Glass becomes new glass bottles and jars
- ◆ Aluminum cans become new aluminum cans
