

The Public Safety Committee for the City of Junction City met in regular session at 6:34 p.m. on Tuesday, June 16, 2020, in a virtual meeting format via internet and phone.

PRESENT WERE: City Councilors, Rob Stott (Chair), Bill DiMarco and Andrea Ceniga, Chief Bob Morris, Administrator Jason Knope

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Stott called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes for the previous meeting were approved

3. CHANGES TO THE AGENDA

No Changes

4. CMI Contract (Housekeeping)

Chief Morris explains that this item is nothing more than housekeeping. He states that there are 3 documents to discuss. First is the CMI master agreement, CMI was owned by Ron Taylor until late 2017 or early 2018. During the time he serviced Junction City the CAD software had been purchased all these years annually without a contract. In 2018 the company was sold. The new owner wanted to formalize things and created 2 documents, a master agreement which outlines terms and conditions and tiers of services. A partner doc to that master agreement is an order form, this is where costs and expenses are identified, and agencies commit to the costs and expenses. The order form also identifies areas of the order and term of the order. The master agreement should have been signed in 2018.

Chief Morris stated the first order of business is that the master agreement needs to be signed.

Chief Morris then explains that the second part is the order form for the Junction City Police Department. This order form will go from July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2023. The order form identifies the license level and it shows what services are covered. This is the second document purposed to be taken to council.

Chief Morris continues with the third part of this which is the order form for the University of Oregon. Chief explains that Coburg is considered a "Sub agency" of Junction City and the benefit of this is that it was less expensive to come on and buy services a la cart, rather than buying a whole package. This was also supposed to be in a contract that was never signed and when Coburg advised CMI they would be leaving, even though they didn't have a signed contract they were still going to be legally liable for the last year of the contract. The city of Coburg made the decision that they were not going to pay that amount. This caused an issue not only for CMI to get those funds but JCPD would have a contractual obligation to provide Coburg with all their records. This could have cost close to ten thousand dollars. CMI was generous in not charging us Junction City these costs and agreed to provide Coburg with a very limited format of the data they need. In the end Coburg worked it out with CMI and paid and got their data. University of Oregon is going

to come on as a sub agency of Junction Cities and that saves them 10-15 thousand dollars annually. Chief Morris recommended to their contracting team that Junction City modifies their existing IGA with University of Oregon and sign the contract on behalf of University of Oregon and bill them as a pass through expense. University of Oregon agreed to this.

Councilor Ceniga asked if the contract signing would be approved by University of Oregon

Chief Morris confirms that it will be approved by University of Oregon before it goes to council but wanted to make sure that PSC agreed with it first.

This was recommended to go to council for approval.

5. OTHER BUSINESS

Councilor DiMarco inquired that he heard the city had been approved for some grant money.

Chief Morris stated that he has little details on that but did hear that the city got a sizeable amount of money but has little information. Chief Morris stated that there are two to three grants in the works for the city.

Councilor Ceniga stated she has a concern about the livestock auction on HWY 99. They have had some parking happening on 99 and she is concerned for the safety issue this causes.

Chief Morris states he is not aware of this problem but will look into it.

Chair Stott stated that he wants to thank Chief and all the police department and all that they have been doing during this time. Chair Stott questions about an incident from last week, asking if the Chief could comment on it.

Chief Morris explains the unfolding of the events that led to the call where JCPD was looking for suspect, Victor Burgoyne. After investigation Junction City had discovered that Burgoyne had shot at a house in Harrisburg where his ex-girlfriend's parents lived and on Monday, he had shot at a home in Junction City. After investigation Junction City was confident Burgoyne had tried to kill the people in those homes. A Press release went out looking for Burgoyne, he was last seen with his truck and trailer. Because of a tip from a person that called into the Junction City Police Dept, JCPD found out the trailer was in Eugene. The trailer was found and people in the neighborhood confirmed seeing Burgoyne. A perimeter was set up and Eugene Police were contacted and assisted in setting a perimeter and securing the neighborhood, a search warrant was started. Prior to being able to provide a search warrant Burgoyne was spotted leaving this residence, which then resulted in a pursuit with Eugene, Lane County, OSP and Junction City. During the pursuit Burgoyne shot himself in the head, the car rolled, leaving the roadway. He was transported to a hospital where he was then pronounced deceased.

Councilor DiMarco goes back to the livestock saying that JCPD does have right of way

with the road but the auction is in the county.

Chief Morris explains because of that there may not be much we can do but Officer Serrano will follow up with the auction as we do have a good working repour with them.

6. ADJOURNMENT

As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:08pm.
