What is Clean Sweep? Clean sweep is a chance for Junction City residents to bring their residential yard debris (grass trimmings, bush prunings, leaves, and tree limbs) to the Public Works shop at 1395 Elm Street FREE of charge on **Saturday, May 18 from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm** and **Saturday, November 16 from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm.**



Please note unacceptable materials include furniture, poison oak, dirt, sod, stumps, metal, rocks, roofing materials, construction debris, and bagged yard debris.

Junction City Ordinance 591 Reminders



Section 6 (1) - Debris

No owner or person in charge of abutting property shall allow accumulation of decomposed animal or vegetable matter, garbage, rubbish, manure, offal, ashes, discarded containers, waste, paper, debris, trash, hay, grass, straw, weeds, litter, or other refuse matter or substance which, by itself or in conjunction with other substances, is deleterious to public health or comfort, or is unsightly, or creates an offensive odor. This includes the streets and alleys.

Section 6 (2) - Noxious weeds & tall grass

No owner or person in charge of abutting property shall allow growth of Russian thistle, Canadian thistle, Chinese thistle, white mustard, cocklebur, silver saltbush, foxtail, or any other noxious weed; and allow growth of any grass **over 10 inches** in height.

Section 11 (1) - Trees

No owner or person in charge of abutting property shall allow any brush, bushes, trees, limbs, shrubbery, flowers, or other growth, whether grown for food, fuel, shade, or ornamentation, to project over a sidewalk at an elevation of **less than 8 feet** above the level of the sidewalk, or over a street at an elevation of **less than 13 feet 6 inches** above the level of the street.
